The savanna's existence is dependent on relatively frequent, low-severity fires, but recent human alteration of the fire regime (both too much and too little fire) and certain logging practices threaten the habitat. The nature and balance of the different threats vary across landscapes, social groups, and jurisdictions, and conservation of the habitat and its natural resources requires ecological solutions and ecological translation tailored to different users.
